<p>Energy Training Partnership</p> <p>Eligibility: Two applicant pools: (1) National labor-management organizations or (2) statewide or local nonprofit partnerships. All applicants must work with labor, WIBs, and other partners noted in section 171(e)(2)(B)(ii) of WIA.</p> <p>(1) Statewide or local entities: Local WIBS must be included as partners but are <u>NOT</u> eligible applicants. Applicant must be a local or statewide nonprofit entity with a partnership of labor organizations, WIBs, One-Stops, and employers/associations. Additional suggested partners: education/training providers, state and federal agencies related to apprenticeships and energy, faith and community based organizations, and organizations that are creating jobs funded by ARRA.</p> <p>(2) National labor-management organizations: entities that provide joint labor-management training programs in multiple sites across the country. Grant amount: \$2 million to \$4 million for local grantees; \$3 to \$8 million for national grantees Period of performance: 2 years Due date: 9/29/09</p>
